Our landmark \$45m My Home, My Life initiative has now entered its third year of a four-year project. We're on-track to renovate and build more than 90 modern houses, townhouses, duplexes and apartments across Queensland.



This is the most significant spending initiative in Endeavour Foundation's history—a feat impossible without the support of our generous lottery ticket buyers, supporters and donors. A fourth member of the household, John O'Sullivan, attended the event and also calls the new house home.





In other news

Endeavour Foundation partners with Defence

Endeavour Foundation is excited to partner with the Department of Defence in our ongoing commitment to providing employment opportunities to people with disability.

The Defence Assistance Program (DAP) has been successfully operating since 2014 as a Defence initiative providing access to employment for people living with disability in all Australian states and territories. DAP provides support such as mentoring, training, adjustments and technology to employees with disability.

Under the three-year program, Endeavour Foundation is directly responsible for Defence sites in QLD, NSW and VIC, with key partners running day-to-day operations in ACT, WA, SA and NT.

Disability Royal Commission

In February, the Disability Royal Commission held its 32nd public hearing.

Our CEO David Swain represented Endeavour Foundation in two panel hearings focusing on the policies and practices of service providers to identify best practice responses in how to prevent the violence, abuse, neglect and exploitation of people with disability.

Since the Commission was established in April 2019, we have welcomed their work and are pleased it has provided a platform for people with disability to share their stories and experiences.

We look forward to the Commission's final report in September 2023 and learning from their recommendations to ensure greater safety and a stronger human rights focus, especially when guided by the voices of people with disability.

2022 Annual Report is now available

Endeavour Foundation's annual report celebrates key achievements and provides performance overviews for 2021-22.

In 2022, we supported over 4,000 people with disability:



500 people in accommodation



1,700 people in employment



1,000 people through learning and life skills programs



1,100 people with in-home support and community access

Providers work together to create employment opportunities

Australia continues to have some of the lowest unemployment rates since records began, yet unemployment rates for Australians living with disability remain stubbornly high.



Endeavour Foundation wants to change this outlook.

In 2022, we brought together 40 disability social enterprises to discuss how to create sustainable employment changes for the people we support.

Endeavour Foundation CEO and forum organiser David Swain said, "We know disability social enterprises should not be the only answer to employment opportunities for people with disability, but they exist for a reason. Almost a third of working Australians with severe or profound disability are employed in a disability social enterprise, which provides the level of support they need to be working successfully." Mr Swain said.

At the Forum's conclusion, 40 social enterprise organisations - representing 9,000 employees with disability - signed a consensus statement offering insights into sector-wide concerns and a vision for the future. Endeavour Foundation employee Andrew Negrelli lives with disability. "For a person with disability it's really hard to find a job. There are different barriers involved," Andrew said.

"If Endeavour Foundation work wasn't available, I'd feel really disappointed, because I don't think there are as many opportunities in more mainstream jobs, nor do I think they're as flexible."

Our second Futures Forum in March 2023, with the theme #KeepInnovating, drew more than 50 disability social enterprise CEOs and senior staff together. We examined innovative employment models to deliver better employment outcomes, and heard the results of the Our Voice Australia survey of supported employees and carers. The Department of Social Services also presented a series of supported employment principles that will underpin government action and reform.

Endeavour Foundation believes everyone has a right to access employment and work in a job of their choice.

We remain committed to working with other disability providers (and the government) to create employment options for people with disability.





Finding independence in a new community

Moving out of home is a big deal! It's common to be a little unsure when you make the decision to live independently. It's something that often involves the whole family and can be a big change for everyone.

Andrew says he was ready to move out of the family home and live independently in early 2021. Making the decision to move from Toowoomba to Ipswich was easy, it's where his dad and step mum live. Andrew felt excitement mixed with uncertainty and nerves.

With support from his dad and step mum, Andrew's NDIS team found the right home for him.

"They worked with my carer and family to find a house for me. I went to visit a house, to see my room – my own space, and where all my stuff would go. I got to decide if I liked it – if it was a nice place to live, and I said, yep, I like it!" Andrew said.

Having found Supported Independent Living he liked, the next step was to meet his potential housemates and support workers. Andrew said he enjoyed meeting his housemates, "I met my future housemates and liked them. We talked about who does the cooking and cleaning, favourite music, TV shows, and general stuff we liked to do," he said



Andrew said meeting the housemates and transitioning into the home was a positive experience. It gave him and his family the opportunity and time to get to know everyone a bit better and make sure he was happy and confident with his choice.

Andrew said he has settled well into his new home. **"I've got the best housemates. We** have a good life, and great support."

My Home, My Community

Friendship is an important part of everyone's life. While it can be challenging to meet new people you truly connect with, social connection plays an important role in living your best life.



Andrew has developed a network of friends and support around him. He has quickly established himself at home and within his local community of lpswich.

As a social person, Andrew likes to be out and about in the community. His home is in a great location with easy access to transport, amenities and local shops and facilities.

Andrew spends his weekdays working on his goals at the Learning and Lifestyle hub. "I go to Endeavour Foundation Monday to Friday and I have a lovely time with my friends," Andrew said.

A highlight of his week is Men's Shed. Andrew said he also enjoys arts, cooking, workshops and going out for coffee with friends.

Andrew's weekends are about relaxing and catching up with family and friends whether it's heading to the movies or for a walk and coffee in Queens Park.

"Ipswich is close to everything like transport, people and friends. One of the best places in Ipswich is the Sunday markets for fresh fruit and vegetables. I'll catch the bus there and the library because they have comic books – Batman is my favourite superhero character!" Andrew said. Inspired by a trip to a local Bunnings, Andrew recently turned his hand to gardening, creating a veggie garden in his backyard.

"I'm growing cauliflower, snow peas, onions, tomatoes and broccoli. There's also spring onions and some herbs," he said.

Andrew has settled into a relaxed environment with housemates that have become his friends.

Andrew said he particularly enjoys cooking and is happy to be in the kitchen. As the self-appointed 'best cook' he enjoys healthy eating and has a 'health start' plan in place. With a veggie patch now in the backyard, homegrown goodies may feature on the menu very soon.

"I like my life. I have my own space, my own TV, and I've got nice posters in my room. I have a great life with my friends," he said.

Tips and Tricks for employment success

There are many ways to succeed in your career. The best way to get started is having a good idea of what you want to achieve. Having a goal helps you and your support coordinator choose job opportunities that align with what you want to do and what you care about.

Talk to your support coordinator about:

- what you like
- what you're good at, and
- what you want to achieve in your career.

Your support coordinator will consider your strengths and abilities when exploring the different options available to you.

Use different funded supports

If employment is one of your goals, there are several types of support available.

Coordination of Supports

If you're already working with a support coordinator, you might know about this one. You can use this funding item to get a support coordinator to help you work out the type of job you want to do and to investigate employment opportunities.

Supports in Employment

This is the most common and flexible type of employment support available in NDIS plans. You can use this support to learn basic work skills and explore options related to your employment goals.

Individual Employment Support

This item allows you and your support provider to manage any barriers you may have to keeping a job. This might mean, doing a TAFE course while working part time, or changing one of your days of work to activities at the Learning and Lifestyle hub.

Individual Assessment, Therapy and/or Training (Including Assistive Technology)

You can use this item to arrange for an occupational therapist to visit your workplace to ensure you are set up to succeed.

Specialist Behaviour Intervention Support

Managing tough emotions or behaviours while at work is hard some days, but that's okay. This funding item gives your support worker access to your workplace to help you on the days when you struggle emotionally.

Your support coordinator can also help you create a plan that includes ways to build your skills to achieve specific career goals – like working in mainstream employment.

Employment isn't just about earning money – although that is one of the benefits! At Endeavour Foundation, we believe helping the people we support to find jobs is an important part of creating an inclusive, empowered life for people with disability.

Employment can bring many positives, such as:

- a sense of purpose
- an opportunity to contribute to your community
- social inclusion
- opportunity to gain new skills, plus
- a boost to your confidence and self-esteem.

Enjoying online spaces every day and identifying online dangers

Endeavour Foundation Administrative Assistant, Madison Beresford, enjoys different social platforms and practises online safety. Sometimes things happen that you don't expect. Like encountering an online scam.



Scammers have been in the news a lot lately. Unfortunately, Madison recently encountered one of these scammers. Rather than considering it a negative experience she wants to use it as a tool to help others be more vigilant.

One morning, Madison was told by her colleagues that they received hostile messages from Madison's Instagram account. These messages were insisting they help reset her password. Luckily, her colleagues knew the messenger couldn't have been Madison.

They told Madison her account had probably been hacked.

Madison is a frequent user of Instagram. Using the platform to connect with friends and celebrities she adores. She would message celebrities and comment on their posts.

Scammers use comment sections of celebrity accounts to identify potential targets.

Madison received a private message from someone claiming to be a celebrity's manager. They offered Madison a VIP ticket to meet the celebrity. In exchange, Madison had to disclose personal and financial details.

This is a common trick and can look and sound legitimate. Madison provided this information. The scammer threatened to sell Madison's information online unless she sent them an iTunes gift card.

It was at that point a link was clicked and her account was hacked.

"When my colleagues told me someone was pretending to be me, I was scared for everyone's safety and my own, and I was devastated that an awful person would stoop so low," Madison said.

She said she felt silly that she fell for such a trap. But she shouldn't; this situation could happen to anyone. In fact, one in nine Australians experienced personal fraud in 2020-21 (ABS, 2022).

When asked why she wanted to share her story, Madison said, "I have grown into a more mature person because of this experience. I'm aware now and I want to help others be aware too."

Madison wants other people to be able to identify potential online dangers. "Make sure you only friend people you actually know and don't answer messages or click on links sent from strangers. Just block and ignore them." Madison said.

How the right support helped Meaghan balance study with full-time work



Meaghan was working fulltime in the disability sector when she started her Certificate IV in Disability with BRACE.

She works for a company that employs people with disability

and provides opportunities and the skills to support employees to excel in their workplace and beyond into mainstream employment.

She wanted to continue working in the sector and decided to complete a qualification that would expand her career options.

Meaghan works in HR training and support and wears a lot of different hats. She looks after about 100 employees by:

- supporting them to set goals in their NDIS plans
- organising training
- supporting them to overcome any barriers in the workplace.

She also guides the employees in their search for outside-of-work interests and hobbies. Meaghan also makes sure work policies are up to date and that people with disability contribute to the creation of these policies.

Meaghan's job provides her with different situations every day and her qualification from BRACE has helped her tremendously. "Every unit that I did in my Certificate IV in Disability I could bring back into work." Meaghan admitted going back to study was difficult. At first, she found it challenging to adjust, but she can't praise her teacher enough.

"I was never someone who was good at school and taking on the course while working full time with two kids at home was stressful," she said.

"But my teacher took the stress away and really put it into everyday situations that I could understand. It was great."

Starting studies with great support

To Meaghan, one of the things that stood out for her at BRACE was that the experience was so interactive. She said there was tremendous support at BRACE.

"I could email and say I was having trouble with a particular module, and I was always offered time for one-on-one support, and would get back on the right page to keep going," she said.

Meaghan wants to continue the disability career pathway and is considering undertaking more qualifications.

"If I do study, I will go through BRACE. The whole experience has been amazing. I'm better off for it."

Nathan said preparations were already underway for the 2023 Great Endeavour Rally, which heads to Cape York in Far North Queensland.

"We want this rally to grow and take on more participants and clients who want to have an adventure like no other and who share our drive for helping everyone thrive each and every day," Nathan said.

Paving the road to mainstream employment for people with disability

Endeavour Foundation's Disability Research Fund invests in projects that improve life for people with disability.

Recipients Dr Ashokkumar Manoharan and Flinders University research team are conducting research to increase mainstream employment for people with disability. Their study focuses on the hospitality industry.

The study is currently in its first stage, where the team set out to identify the barriers employers face when hiring people with disability. We spoke to Senior Lecturer at Flinders University, Dr Manoharan who is leading the study.

"Delivering sustainable mainstream employment for people with intellectual disability is of high priority. Yet most research in the area focuses on job readiness rather than employer readiness," said Dr Manoharan.

"The hospitality industry is a potentially attractive employer of people with intellectual disability, but barriers exist. Some large organisations in the hospitality industry employ people with intellectual disability. However, 76% are small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) and have been slower to support their recruitment."

Engaging with key hospitality workers is an essential focus of the study. This is to assess the attitudes and expectations of employers when hiring. Understanding their perspectives will help the researchers understand the barriers to employment. Hospitality workers can identify

enablers for sustainable employment of people with intellectual disability.

Research Officer Dr Graeme Payne has completed 40 interviews with senior staff in the hospitality industry.

Those interviewed* have addressed challenges for people with disability. They have reported successful and rewarding experiences for their teams.

"Our business is about integrity and trust. We show we care for our staff, patrons, and our community. Taking on a person with an intellectual disability aligns with our values and shows we go the extra mile."

"People with intellectual disability may need additional support, but so do new workers". Hotel Assistant Manager

Independent Advocacy and Disability Royal Commission (DRC) consultant, Sundara Rengasamy, is a passionate advocate. Sundara strongly backs people with intellectual disability in sustainable mainstream employment. Sundara hopes the study will surge the demand for people with disability in the hospitality industry.

"From this experience, I have learnt that hospitality workers are interested in talking to employment services. They want to help people with disability enter the hospitality industry." Sundara said.

"I would like to tell the hospitality managers hiring people with intellectual disabilities to look at their ability and skill sets."

The research team continues their work to identify barriers of sustainable mainstream employment. Next, they will launch a nationallevel survey. The findings will guide the development of a toolkit for SME businesses. The toolkit will support employers to recruit people with intellectual disability.
