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QUEENSLAND **Subsidy Scheme** EXTENDED

Together we achieved a significant change this year, when people with disability, their families, service providers and advocates raised serious concerns about the withdrawal of the Queensland Taxi Subsidy Scheme (TSS) for NDIS participants on June 30.

What we wanted

The Queensland Government to extend the TSS for two years while NDIS funding negotiations are settled; and low interest loans to be made available for wheelchair accessible taxi replacements.

What we got

In May the Queensland Government extended the TSS for 12 months and gave \$21M over four years to cover half the replacement cost of wheelchair accessible taxis.

Endeavour Foundation worked with Vision Australia and Spinal Life Australia to raise awareness of the vital role the TSS plays for individuals with disability to access health care, employment and access the community.

Members, carers and people with disability got behind the campaign by making phone calls, writing letters and emails, meeting Members of Parliament, giving media interviews and sharing social media posts.

Our combined e-petition was signed by 5,649 people in just five weeks, while an open letter was signed by 13 different disability service providers and advocacy groups.

Congratulations and thank you to everyone who got behind the TSS campaign. Let's hope NDIS transport funding is resolved before the Queensland Taxi Subsidy is withdrawn from NDIS participants again in June 2020.

Raising the roof at Kearneys Spring

On Wednesday 1 May, customers and families travelled from all over Toowoomba to experience the Kearneys Spring Learning and Lifestyle hub.

During the open day we welcomed existing and new customers, families, support coordinators and even one of our Endeavour Foundation founding members, John Kajewski.

The event was headlined by crowd favourite "KingStones" who performed a number of original songs as well as a few classics. The band of people with disability raised the roof and the audience enjoyed dancing and singing along into the early afternoon.

Guests had the opportunity to experience our modern facilities, enjoy a sausage sizzle or a salad sandwich prepared by our customers, as well as engage with our ground-breaking Virtual Reality Learning Environment and use our 3D printer to create their very own figurines. Guests also had the opportunity to participate in activities designed to teach numeracy and work skills.

Not only did he want to cut the grass, he also wanted to be told "well done" — something our political leaders were very happy to do. Prime Minister Scott Morrison and the Opposition Leader at the time, the Hon. Bill Shorten both agreed that Josh did a fantastic job.

Speaker of the House the Hon. Tony Smith and the Hon. Paul Fletcher also made an appearance to congratulate Josh.

In between living his dream, shaking hands with politicians and being photographed by the media, Josh got a private tour of Parliament House and made great friends with the landscaping crew. He also enjoyed lunch with his family and guests in the private dining room.

All the fun was aired nationally on Sunrise, Channel 9 News in Sydney and Adelaide, and featured in the Courier Mail.





"I swear that Joshua is walking straighter and taller since we returned, believing that he truly does have abilities that are valued and appreciated by some very high-ranking people.

The Royal Commission – starting soon

Australia will soon have a Royal Commission inquiring into Violence, Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation of People with Disability.

Endeavour Foundation has strongly supported the establishment of a Royal Commission. We are an organisation that was established to meet the needs and advance the human rights of people with disability and we welcome the light a Royal Commission will shine into the disability support sector.

As an organisation, we will engage openly and transparently with the Royal Commission and respond to any requests for information.

By listening to the experiences of people with disability in the Royal Commission, we aim to learn from them and identify areas where we can improve our services and safety.

Endeavour Foundation has called for special witness provisions to be adopted that would assist people with intellectual disability to speak out about their experiences; this reflects the growing recognition in the justice system that people with intellectual disability can provide important testimony if they are supported to do so.

Endeavour Foundation has also written to the Ministers responsible for the Royal Commission. highlighting opportunities for improved reporting, investigation, response and oversight of alleged abuse within the disability support sector.

What will the Royal Commission do?

The Royal Commission will primarily inquire into violence, abuse, neglect and exploitation of people with disability, in all contexts and settings, and at any time in the past.

The Royal Commission will also look at prevention and protection measures; best-practice reporting, investigation and response; and how society can address contributing factors through greater inclusion.

The Royal Commission will be based in Brisbane. The Hon. Ronald Sackville AO QC has been appointed as Chair of the Royal Commission, supported by five other Royal Commissioners: Ms Barbara Bennett PSM, Dr Rhonda Galbally AC, Ms Andrea Mason OAM, Mr Alastair McEwin and the Hon. John Ryan AM.

The Commissioners will produce an interim report by 30 October 2020 and a final report by 29 April 2022.

Visual diaries and drafts strewn across workbenches. Ceramics awaiting their final firing in the kiln. Canvases proudly displayed in a salon-style hang. A warm and friendly camaraderie.

Located in Kew in Melbourne. Endeavour Foundation's OArt Studio is an Australian Disability Enterprise that provides employment, training and mentoring for professional artists with disability.

Working under the guidance of a qualified manager, artists are coached in creative techniques and skills and supported to reach their artistic potential. Their pieces are creative and contemporary, working with a variety of tools and media purchased with the profits from their artwork sales.

As a case in point, the artists are regularly commissioned by Endeavour Foundation Lotteries to create original artworks for their lottery homes.

What makes this initiative exciting is that the artists have diverse views of the world and they all express it differently in their practice.

"The artwork which I'm most proud of is 'Ribbon Dancers'. because I've been dancing since I was twelve, and I really love dancing!" says Tara Wood.

Tara, one of QArt Studio's artists, works exclusively on small canvases. Her paintings explore a broad range of subject matter, including decorative floral arrangements, animals and patterns stippled with accents of gold foil and glitter pen.

"I like coming to work," says Tara. "Everyone is so nice. I like talking to them and I have lots of friends here. I'd be bored if I didn't work at QArt Studio; it's a good part of my life!"

In 2011, QArt Studio opened a gift shop and gallery called QArt Gallery, located in the historical Kew Courthouse. The gallery brings experiences of disability

into the public consciousness. It makes possibilities a reality for the artists by providing a platform for them to display and sell their work; an opportunity that they may not have in the wider art world.

When asked why QArt Gallery is important to her, Tara says she feels "Happy and proud... I get a bit excited!" when she sells a painting at QArt Gallery.

The unique purpose of QArt Studio and Gallery is to redefine widely held preconceived notions of disability. Seeing artists like Tara thrive in an environment where their abilities are championed and nurtured is a rewarding experience for everyone involved.

Purchasing original art and locally produced merchandise from QArt Gallery supports employment for artists with disability which in turn contributes to them living productive and engaged lives in society.














With so much information about the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) out there, not everything you hear is going to be correct. It can be hard to know what's right – so we'll debunk some of the myths that we keep hearing.

"When it comes to the NDIS, everyone else knows exactly what's going on."

If you're confused by the NDIS, you're not alone!

The NDIS is complicated. It is continually evolving and can be a lot to take in. Few people have a comprehensive knowledge about the scheme and of course, everyone's situation is unique. No two customers are the same, and neither are their plans.

"The NDIS will replace your **Disability Support Pension."**

No. There is no link between your Disability Support Pension (DSP) and your NDIS funding.

DSP is paid by Centrelink and your NDIS plan is paid by the agency called NDIA.

Your NDIS plan is about the disability supports you need to live and your DSP is about your day-to-day living costs.

They are designed to work alongside each other, not instead of.

The only change you will see from Centrelink will be in relation to the mobility allowance.

"If you're not happy with a decision, there is nothing you can do."

If you think a decision is incorrect or unfair, or you believe your NDIS plan is missing something important that you discussed with your planner at your plan meeting, you can request an internal review of the decisions made.

This basically means that the NDIS will take a second look at their decision.

When asking for a review, it is very important to be able to explain why you think the decision is incorrect, and what supports vou need to make it better.

"Most people who have transitioned are worse off under the NDIS."

Overall, we've been finding that most people tend to be happy with their plans. In fact, according to a recent COAG report, 88% of NDIS participants reported that they are satisfied with the NDIS.

The Productivity Commission estimates that under an NDIS, no one will be worse off than they currently are. It also predicts that many people will be better off under an NDIS. This is because the focus is on making sure you get the right amount of supports to participate socially and economically in your community.

"I don't have a choice whether I have a face to face or phone meeting."

You absolutely do.

Don't be afraid to ask for something that better suits your needs. If you prefer a face to face meeting and the planner is organising a phone meeting speak up! Let them know what works best for you.

It's also worth noting that if the planner calls at a bad time, you don't have to have the planning meeting straight away. You can ask them to call you back.

By doing these things it may make the process take a little longer, but you won't miss out on your plan meeting.

"Respite is not funded by the NDIS."

Currently there is no item listed under NDIS specifically as 'respite', which has caused some confusion.

Respite is available and is described as "Supports for Sustaining Informal Supports and Short Term Accommodation."

"The NDIS will pay for my holiday."

They will not pay for your holiday, but they may help fund additional supports that are needed as part of your disability. The NDIS exists to close the gap between having a disability and not having a disability.

It all comes down to what is reasonable and necessary.

"I get to keep my mobility allowance."

Your current mobility allowance ceases once you have transitioned to the NDIS and have a plan.

The NDIS has a different way of funding transport related supports.

It's important that you tell your NDIS planner what your transport needs are so that they are adequately funded.

"I won't be able to manage this on my own."

Your plan could include funding for a Support Coordinator. This is a role that is designed to help you with managing numerous service providers and government

It is important to understand your individual situation and to think about the type of assistance you may need to implement your plan. This can then be discussed at your plan meeting.

"The money from my plan will go straight to my bank account."

Receiving funds depends on how you have chosen to manage your plan. It's something you will talk about and decide with your planner. It could be NDIS managed, self-managed, plan managed or a combination of these.

The NDIA are very strict that the funds you receive are only to be used in the ways outlined in your plan.

If you self-manage you will be responsible for paying for supports using your NDIS funding. You access funding through the myplace portal in two ways using a Make a Payment Request:

- 1. Submit a request for the money you need with an invoice or quote, and then pay for your supports.
- 2. Use your own money, get a receipt and then submit a request for reimbursement.

Money will be paid into your nominated bank account within 24 to 48 hours.

How disability day services have changed

As the world has changed, so too has the calibre of disability supports. A perfect example of this is disability day services. These community-minded hubs have become so much more than just 'a place to spend the day'. It's here that you can develop your independence, confidence, self-esteem and social skills.

What do you mean by day service?

Other names people call it:

Learning and Lifestyle hub (L&L)

Day program

Day respite

Activity centres

What the NDIS calls it:

Centre-based social and recreational activities

They are fun

When it comes to our Learning and Lifestyle hubs — if it's not fun, it doesn't work.

We had a chat to Annabel. She's one of our Learning and Lifestyle customers and had a lot to say about her local L&L.

"It's so, so fun! I came here after I finished school. It's more fun here, it's less fun at school. It's good here because I get to hang out with people more, and school was more homework. Also, you have to do maths tests at school. I like to learn for fun.

My goal is to get fit. I want to be fit and healthy so I can look like a princess in the model world.

My other goal is making lots of friends, but I'm already really good at that.

My other, other goal is to go on a plane by myself and travel independently.

They help me do my goals here. My favourite is when we go to the gym. I feel strong – inside and out.

The staff is really nice too. Clare is my favourite staff because she is fun and she lets me have extra turns on the whiteboard. She is great to have around. She's just awesome. She even talks to you in a nice way by helping you out at money!"

They are all about being part of the community

Many of our customers who attend our Learning and Lifestyle hubs barely spend time within the brick and mortar walls, they are out and about in the community doing what they are interested in.

Brent Suhr is part of our Service Design team and he's a big advocate for community inclusion.

"Back when I was new, I walked in to a Learning and Lifestyle and there was no one there! I thought 'what's wrong here?' Turns out that what was 'wrong' was actually so right," he said.

"People were out for the day, in the community having a great time. At 3pm they came back to the service, singing down the street and you could just tell they had a ball! They were having such a great time engaging with the community.

Now I love it when I go to a Learning and Lifestyle hub and no one is around – it means that when they eventually come back, you'll have some great stories about what they were up to that day."

They used to be the destination, now they're part of the journey

Back in the day, when someone started to go to a day service, that is usually where they would stay.

Now, it's just the beginning.
Many people choose to use our
Learning and Lifestyle hubs to
build confidence, learn new skills
and then they branch off and do
their own thing, whether that be
to start a business, get a job,
or chase their dreams in a
different way.

For people who have a goal, but think 'I'm just not ready to tackle that next step yet', going to a Learning and Lifestyle hub can be great to build the skills you need in a safe and supportive environment. The same goes for school leavers. Leaving school is confronting for anyone, even more so if you have an intellectual disability. Lots of people choose to spend a few years building on their skills, learning and independence before taking their next step.

It's all about you

It's long been known that when it comes to people, a one-size fits all approach never works.

Perhaps the most fundamental change to disability day services has been putting the person with disability in the driving seat.

Brent says he wouldn't have it any other way.

"Their voices are the most important. They know what they want and the goals they want to achieve.

There is nothing more rewarding than when you are out at a Learning and Lifestyle service and you see the parents literally crying with happiness because a milestone or goal has been reached.

I stopped working in the corporate sector to give back to the community, and here I know I'm doing just that. I know that 'making possibilities a reality' is our tagline, but I really think it's the best way to describe what we do."

The NDIS has changed day services

By reshaping the way that disability supports are funded, it's fundamentally changed the whole sector.

Brent Suhr says it's a change for the better.

"The NDIS has empowered people to try new things and see what's possible," says Brent.

It's exciting to watch people achieve their goals. In a pre-NDIS world it was all about making sure people were happy.

Now, it's about ensuring people are safe, happy and growing as an individual. The NDIS is helping people realise their goals, and that's a big change that can't be ignored."

Jenny and Michael's story

15 years ago, Michael's life changed for the better when he moved into one of our supported living arrangements on the Sunshine Coast.



As someone with an intellectual disability, Michael needs support with daily tasks and enjoys learning new skills at his local Learning and Lifestyle hub.

His mum, Jenny is one of our most dedicated supporters and she told

us why she is going to include Endeavour Foundation in her will.

"I'm very passionate about Endeavour Foundation. They rely on public support to maintain these services. And they need your financial help and mine."

"The great thing is that Michael is treated with respect as an individual in the community. I know that if he's with Endeavour Foundation, all his needs are looked after.

They give him the most normal, well-rounded life possible with the security of a place that he calls his home."

"My son's welfare and future is my biggest concern. Without **Endeavour Foundation, life** would be very precarious. I hate to think what life would be like... I can't bear to think about it."

"There are very few other places like this. They're such a great provider of support for people with intellectual disability. "

"Any money invested in Endeavour Foundation is well spent. You know it's going to be used wisely."

"By including Endeavour Foundation in my will, I'm making sure that they will always be able to look after Michael, and I'm helping to guarantee the secure future of more than half a million people with intellectual disability who live in our communities."



A generous gift in will is helping Endeavour Foundation provide another purposefully designed home for people with intellectual disability.

The Bundaberg home was originally an eight-bedroom house and is now being extensively renovated and converted to a duplex with two separate four bedroom residences.

Plans for the building have been prepared in close partnership with existing residents and carers.

Innovative design has been combined with practical, assistive features to help people with disability live more independently. New accessible bathrooms and a modern colour scheme will make the home comfortable and inviting. The addition of artwork,

picture frames and plants will provide a warm, personal touch.

Kerin McMahon from Endeavour Foundation said,

"While the NDIS helps fund housing for people with disability, it's mostly for essential items. With the support of our donors, we're able to make a house feel like a real home.

"We want to create a welcoming environment for our residents. A place where they feel safe and confident," Kerin added.

This project was made possible through a generous gift in will and the house will be ready for tenants in late 2019.

Out of work since 2012, John has faced many barriers — including his disability that have led to anxiety, lack of self-confidence and little hope. Now armed with the right support and connections from his Disability Employment Services (DES) Recruitment Partner, Wendy Hannan, John's story has changed.

John Johnston, a machinery operator from Calliope, has ridden the wave of long-term unemployment. "Some people say that money isn't everything but it's pretty hard to survive without a decent income. You're not going to have the quality of life and the satisfaction that you'll achieve without being employed," John says.

He met with a lot of employment providers but felt all they did was take down his name and contact details. Then he approached Community Solutions, a part of Endeavour Foundation that offers people in Queensland and Victoria employment services, personal wellbeing programs and specialist disability supports.

When he first met Wendy, his DES Recruitment Partner, he was very quiet and withdrawn. John has a disability and has been sick for a couple of years due to injury. He felt like he was going nowhere.

"He came to us with very little hope and job prospects, he didn't think he would ever be able to find employment or find a career path in his chosen field," says Wendy.

John's confidence soared when Wendy found him his first job in years.

"Within the first couple of weeks, she found me employment. I mean, it was only temporary for three or four weeks but I was just so over the moon about

it. That sort of broke the barrier and put me back into the workforce," he says.

Wendy says that John has grown a lot. He's now more confident and he's more financially secure.

"He's always very positive and feels that he's been pumped up a little bit and there is hope!"

John says that Wendy went out of her way to find him a job and he's grateful for her support.

"I was so pleased with her that as soon as I got my second week's pay, I actually bought her a bunch of flowers!"

Wendy found John his machine operator role. He's now working five days a week helping build a local school in Calliope.

"It's what I do, you know, that's what I've been doing for 20 years. I wouldn't still be doing it if I didn't like it," says John.

Disability Employment Services supports people with a barrier to employment to find and keep a job through tailored employment services, training and skill development.

"This is the sixth home we have built in the region in seven years, five of these have been funded by Endeavour Foundation directly, which is a total investment of \$3.3m and shows our ongoing commitment to supporting far north Queenslanders," said Kerin McMahon, Endeavour Foundation's Executive General Manager of Service Delivery.

The house is being built using eco-friendly building products and will have environmentally friendly features including solar power, skylights and solar hot water system.

Russell and John visited their future home and declared that they can't wait for the house to be finished so they can move in!

"I can't wait to cook on my new stove!" Russel said.

NDIS Quality and Safeguards Commission

NDIS Quality and Safeguards Commission (NDIS Commission) is a new independent agency established to improve the quality and safety of NDIS supports and services.

The NDIS Commission is responsible for promoting safety and quality services, resolving problems and identifying areas for improvement so participants can access services and supports that promote choice, control and dignity.

Election 2019

The federal election has come and gone, with a flurry of policy promises for voters with disability and their carers. So, what does the election result mean for the disability sector?

Endeavour Foundation welcomes the decision to create a position in the federal cabinet that is devoted to improving the NDIS. Stuart Robert MP has been appointed Minister for the NDIS and Government Services, while the former Opposition Leader Bill Shorten MP has been appointed Shadow Minister.

Senator Anne Ruston is Minister for Families and Social Services and Linda Burney MP is Shadow Minister for Families and Social Services.

Prime Minister Scott Morrison has identified the NDIS as an immediate focus for government. We hope to see action soon, on the following election commitments:

- NDIS Participant Planning Pathways, with a single NDIS point of contact for participants and the option of longer NDIS plans (up to three years).
- Community Connectors expanded to improve NDIS access for Indigenous Australians, culturally and linguistically diverse communities and ageing parents of people with disability.
- NDIS Participant Service Guarantee to set shorter timeframes for new plans and reviews, with a focus on children, accommodation support and assistive technology.
- A National Disability Information Gateway (website and 1800 number) to help people find local services.
- A 7% employment target for people with a disability in the Australian Public Service by 2025.

Endeavour Foundation will continue to work with State and Commonwealth Governments to see improvements in the NDIS, including through Alliance20 and our peak body, National Disability Services.
